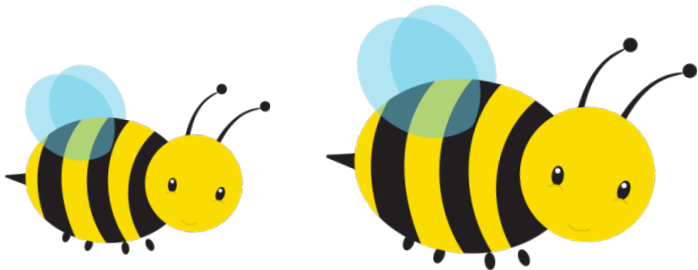


**Pull down twice

the apple crop.**

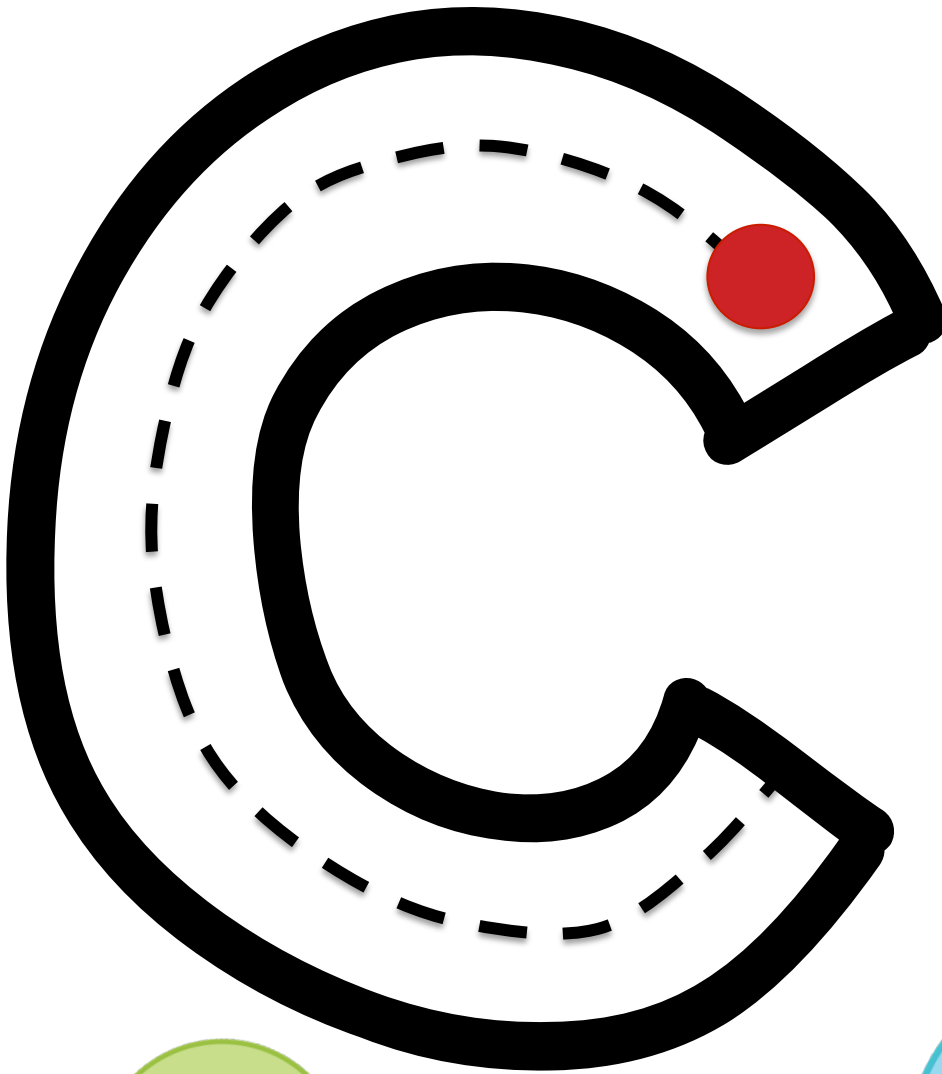


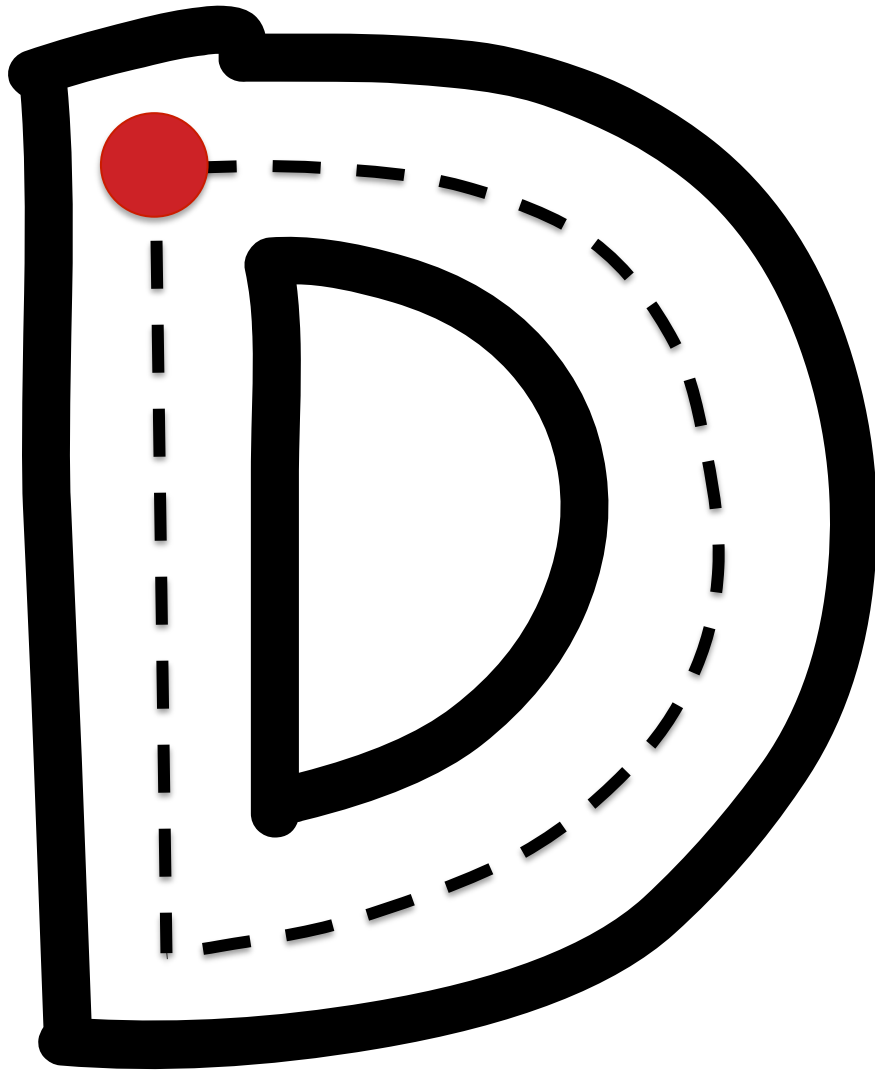


**Straight line down,

letter B!**

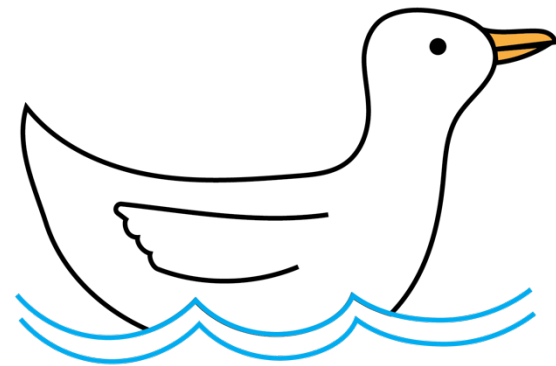
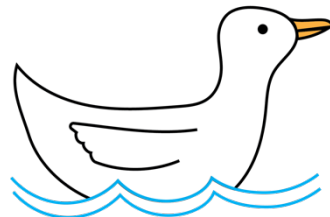
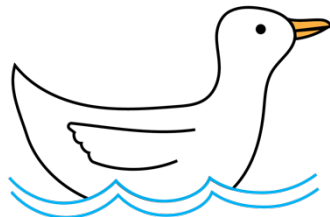
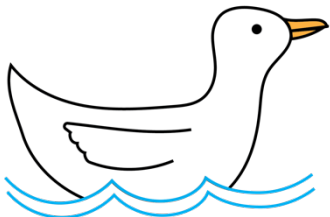


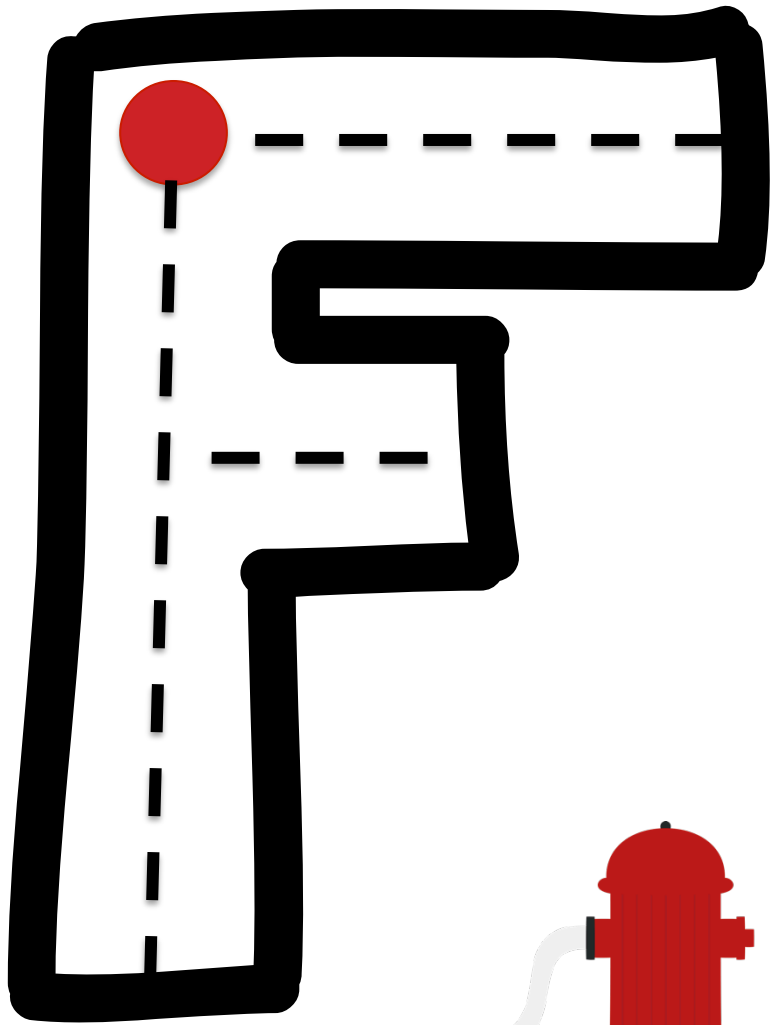
It's easy to make a C, you see. Like a smile big and wide, turned on its side!



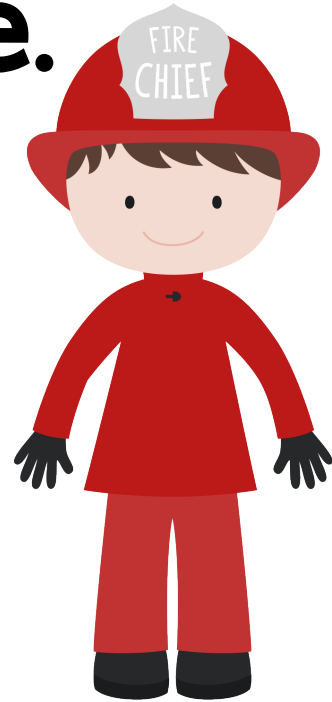
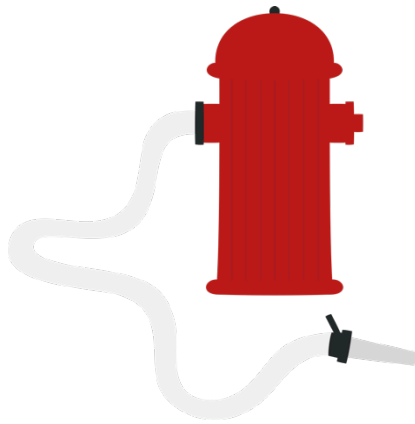


**Straight line to

N starts with a line going straight to the ground. Slant a line and go up, there's no messing around!

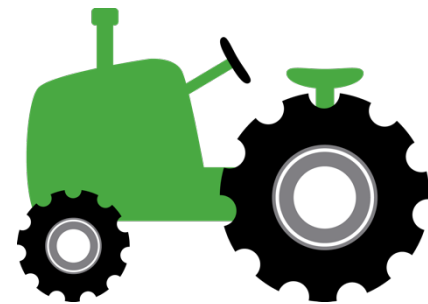
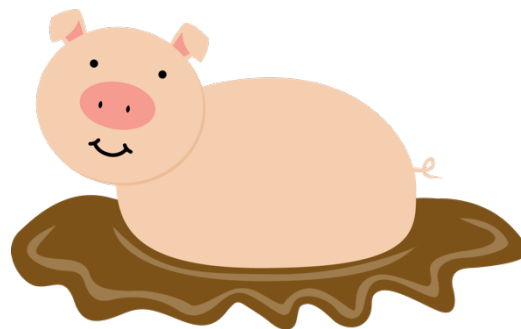
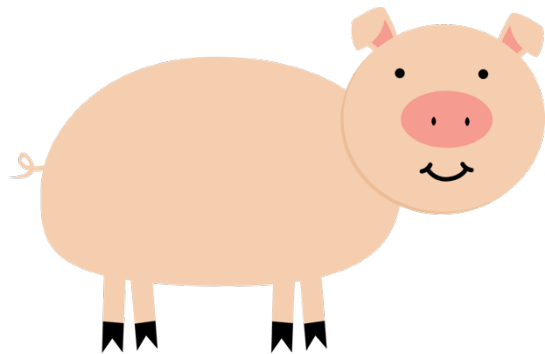
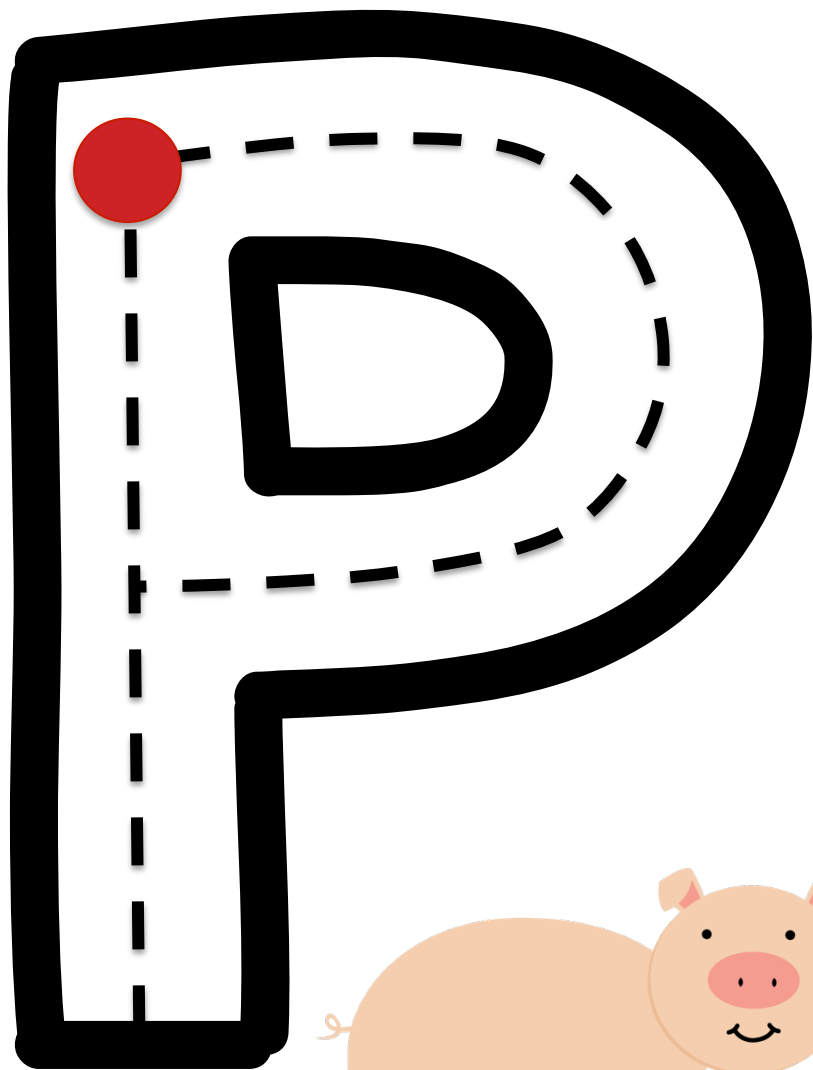


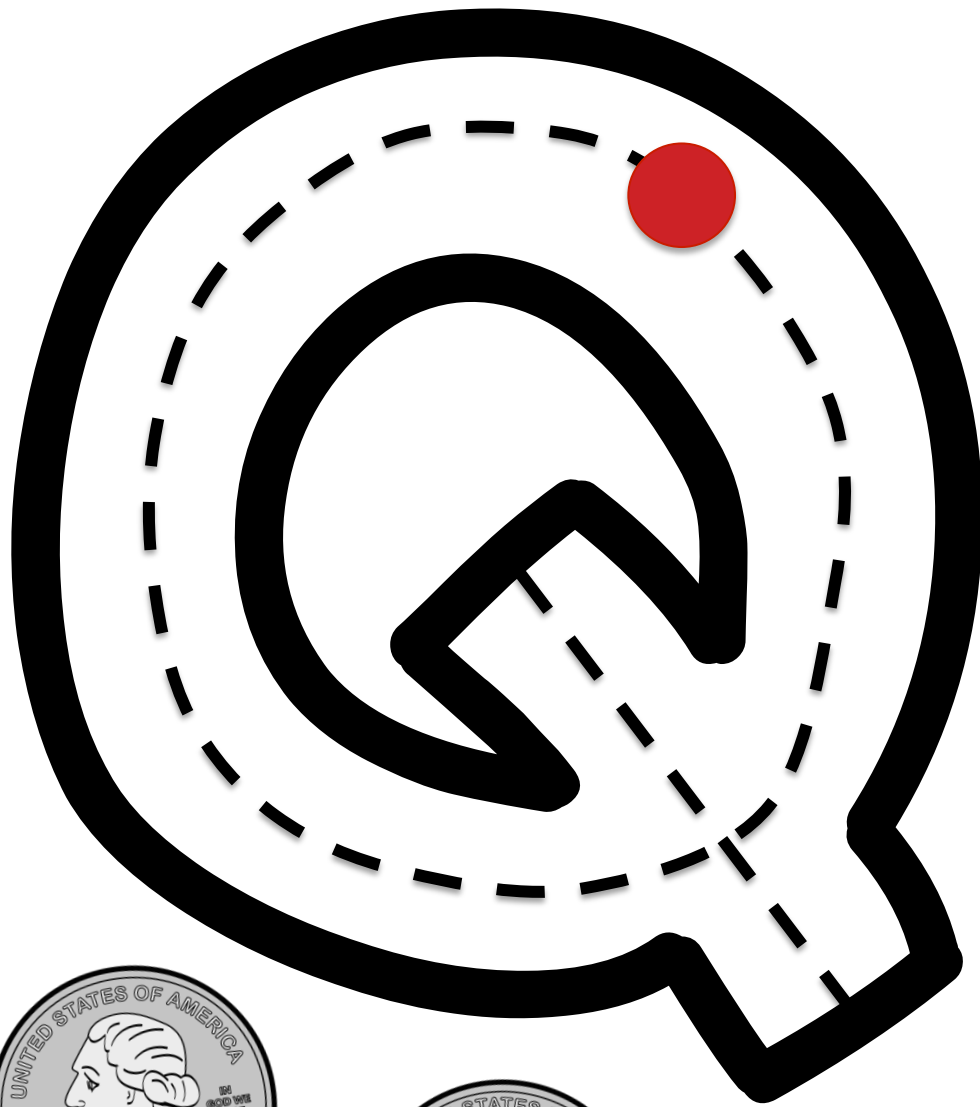

Google Slides

1. When you click on the link on the bottom of this page, it will ask you to make a copy. You need to do this, otherwise changes would be made to my original.
2. If you are a teacher and are using Google Classroom, you will want to copy the Google slides assignment into your Google Drive. After that, you will create an assignment and attach this Google Slides file.
3. Make copy for each student.
4. The students will log into Google Classroom and will find the assignment.
5. After it's open, the students can listen to the audio of the rhyme by clicking the speaker icon.
6. Students can also use the scribble tool to write the numbers. If that is too challenging, they can just write the number in the air.

Seesaw

1. When you click on the link on the bottom of this page, it will bring you to a page on Seesaw.
2. Click on 'Save Activity.'
3. Choose 'Assign' to assign the activity to the students in your class.
4. The students will log into Seesaw and see this new assignment.
5. After it's open, the students can listen to the audio of the rhyme by clicking the quotation mark at the bottom of the page.
6. Students can use the pencil or marker tool to write the letters. If that is too challenging, they can just write the number in the air.
