Dorothy Height



A civil rights and women's rights activist. She was one of the few women who was present at the march where Dr. King delivered his "I Have a Dream" speech.

The inventor of a folding cabinet bed to fit inside of small homes.

William H. Hastie



The first African American Governor of the U.S. Virgin Islands who was also a federal district court judge, and federal appellate judge.

An agricultural scientist and inventor who developed hundreds of different ways to use peanuts.

Coretta Scott King



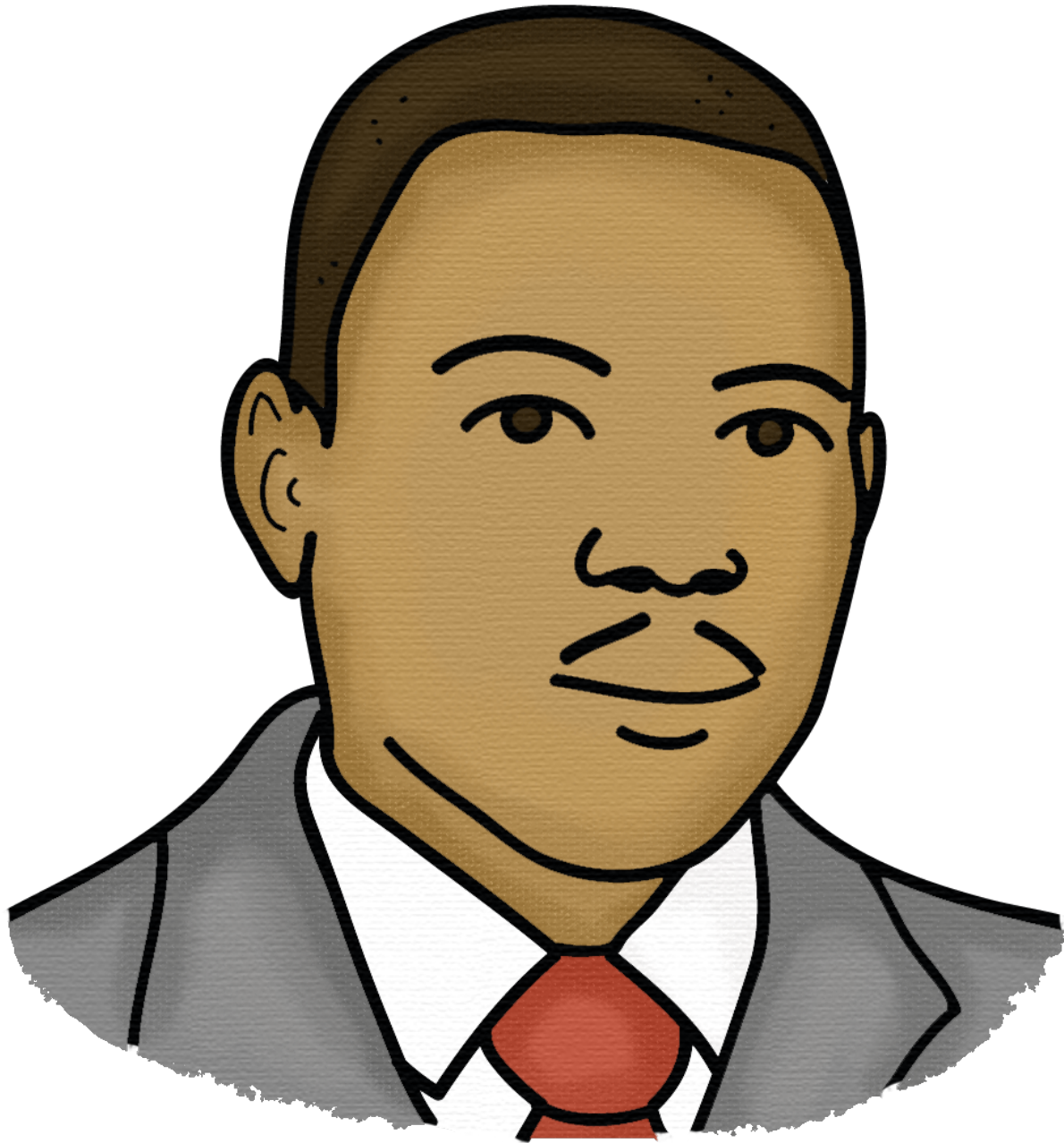
A civil rights activist, author, and the wife

Elijah McCoy



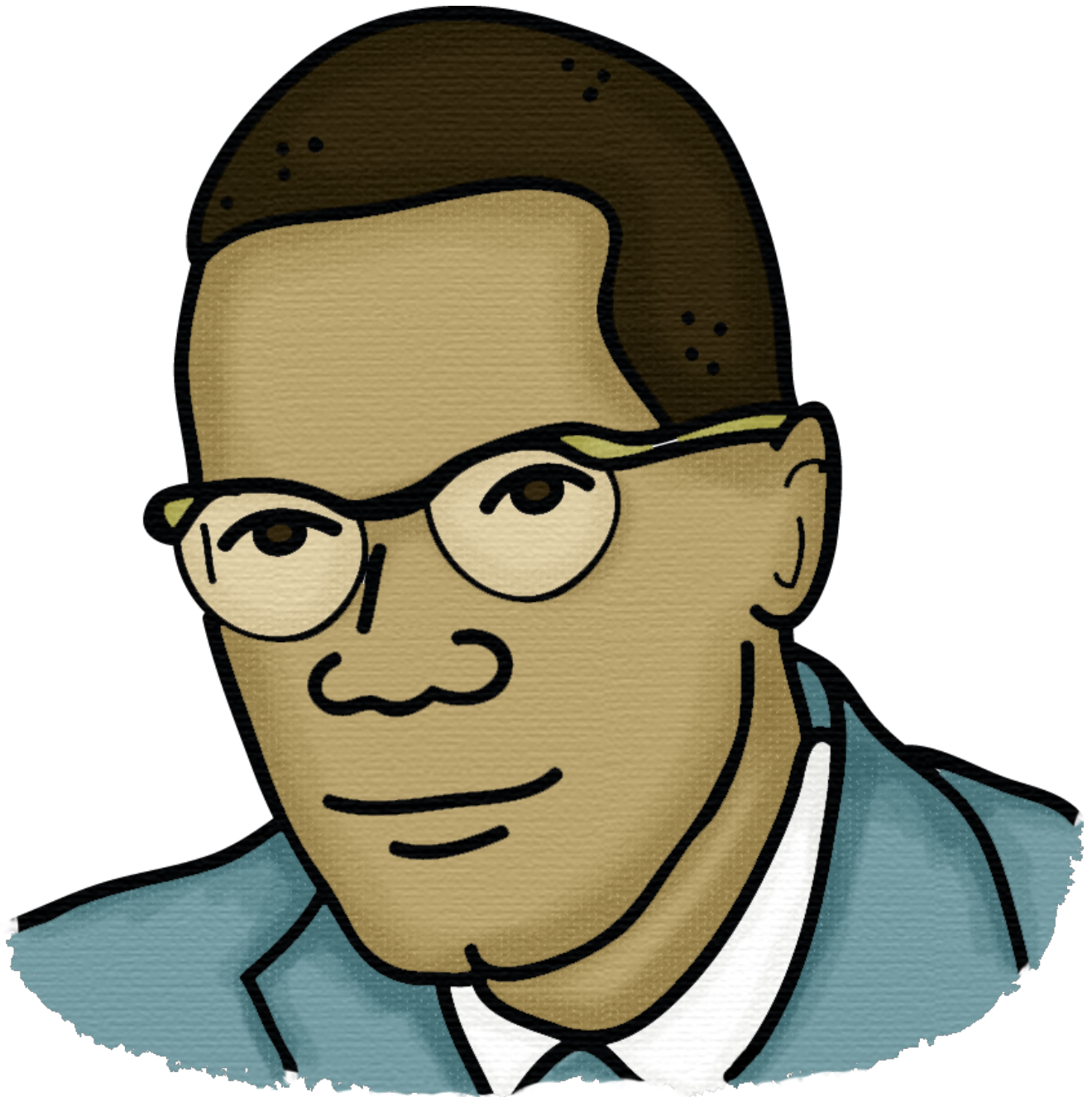
An inventor best known for inventing lubrication devices to make trains travel more efficiently.

Nelson Mandela



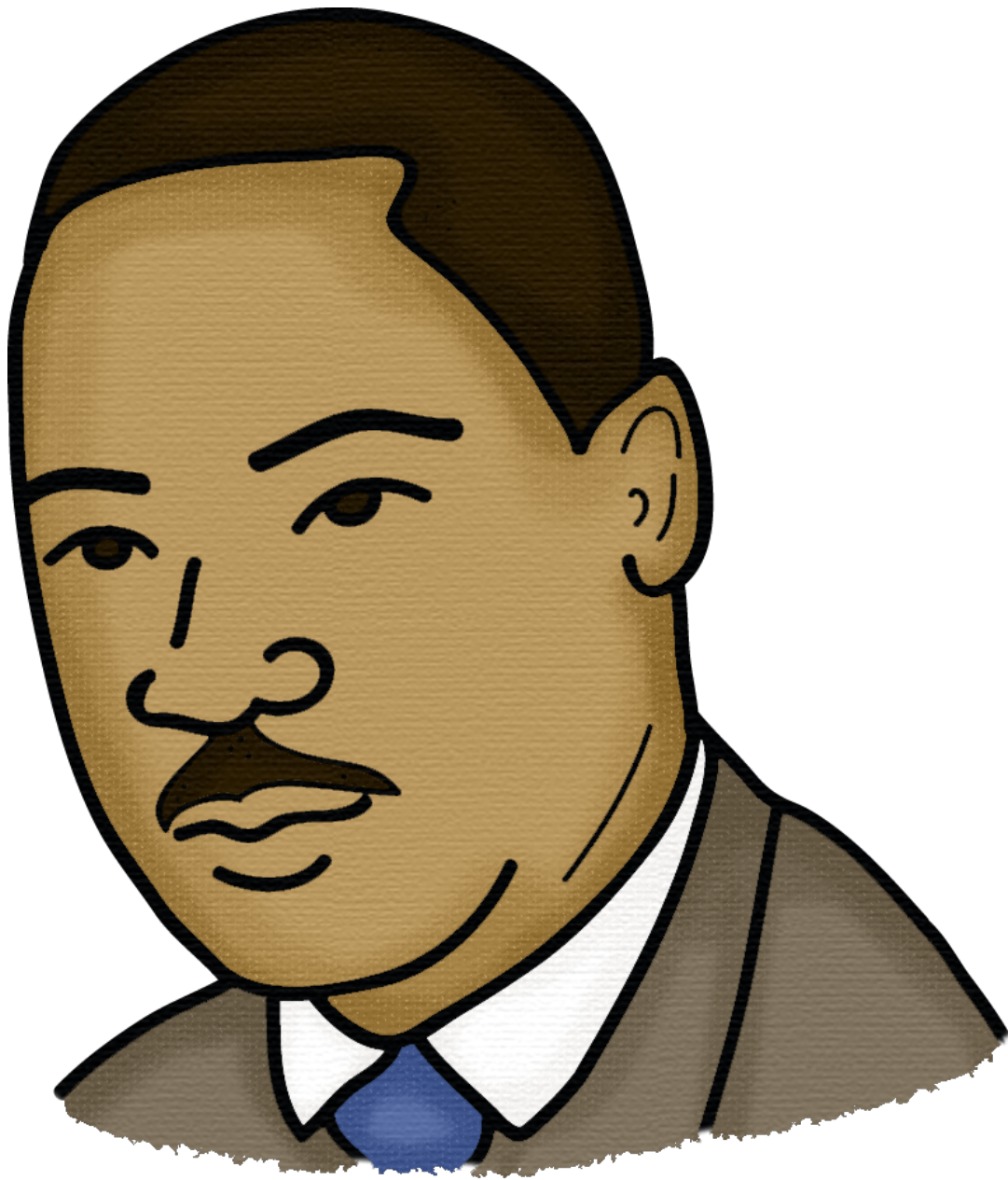
An influential political leader who served as the first president of South Africa. He was also awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1993.

Maya Angelou



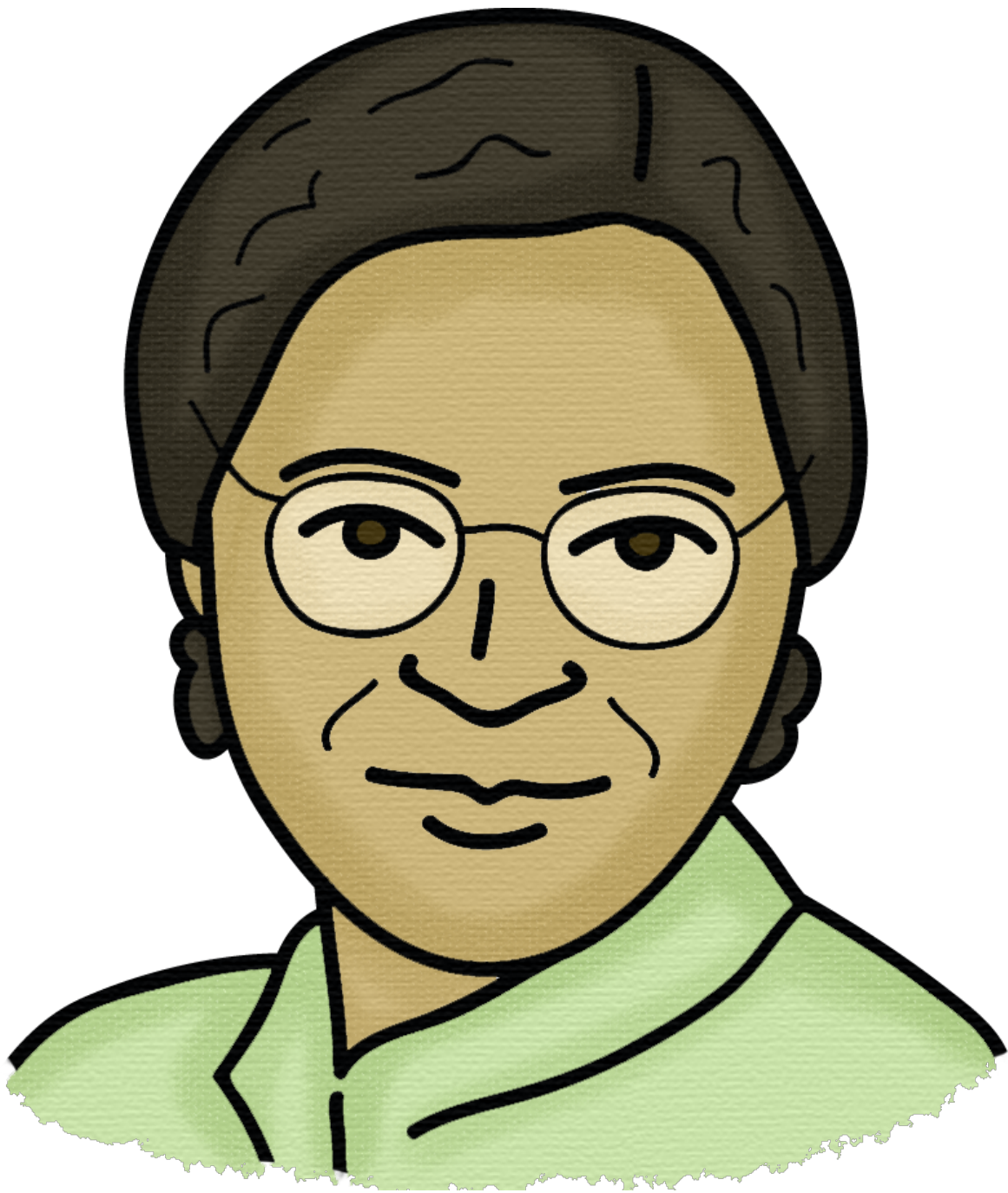
A poet, author, actress, and civil rights activist. She became the first African American to have a nonfiction bestseller for her memoir, *I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings*.

A civil rights activist and the first African American child to integrate an all-white school in Louisiana.

A Jamaican nurse who provided care for British soldiers during the Crimean War.
